

In 2022, 41 grants totaling \$4,297,140 were awarded to charitable programs across Oklahoma. The NRC provided bookkeeping and fiscal sponsorship for 22 area organizations.

PREVENTION PROGRAMS UNUNUNUNUN

Drug-Free Communities

Through the DFC program, NBN leads the Muskogee Community Anti-drug Network in strengthening infrastructure among local partners to reduce local youth substance use. 580 community members were served through vouth coalition work and collaboration with Muskogee County school districts and communities to provide training/professional development and support focused on reducing underage drinking, vaping and substance use/misuse.



YOUTH **PROGRAMS**

Dream Team

The Dream Team After School, Summer Learning, and Night Hoops programs impacted 300 children and their families through educational, social, and nutritional support. These youth programs help students excel in academics, learn social skills, and become productive citizens while offering guidance from community leaders, daily nutritional meals, and a safe environment for the youth of Muskogee. Parents reported 99% of students were able to complete homework and 97% had a better attitude toward learning.

Volunteers in Service to America (VISTA)

NBN sponsored 32 Americorps VISTA members who served at 6 sites: Lake Area United Way's Dolly Parton Imagination Library, Muskogee Teen Center/Youth Volunteer Corps, Dream Team Youth Programs, Muskogee Alumni/Community Band, Community Treasures Youth Summer Camp and Community Food Bank of Eastern Oklahoma.

Summer Food Service Program

In summer 2022, 13,388 meals were served to Muskogee youth from our central kitchen located at the Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Community Center. Sites served included the Community Center, St. Paul Methodist Church, and Muskogee First Assembly of God Church.

Community Treasures

150 K-6th grade students participated in this weekly summer camp that allowed them to explore subjects through hands-on experiments, crafts, special quests, field trips, and activities including local tourism with the "Tourist in Your Town" exploration program.

PFS Communities supported substance use/misuse awareness for 7 school districts in Muskogee and Wagoner counties. NBN also collaborated with area mental health agencies to host the Hope Through Healing Trauma-Informed Community Summit. 320 Community members were served, with 95% reporting a better understanding of being trauma-informed and 97% feeling better equipped to provide trauma-informed care.

Community-Based Prevention (CBPS)

CBPS North serves Muskogee County with focused prevention strategies around opioid and stimulant substance misuse. CBPS South serves McIntosh and Pittsburg counties, with focused prevention strategies around alcohol misuse and adult binge drinking with countywide partnerships. 820 community members were served through these programs.
